
JULY CHALLENGE EXPLANATION

Be Ready

We LOVE having new members, but sometimes I find it difficult to remember names -- even when we wear our name tags. So, beginning at the January meeting, I will be set up to take your picture for a photo directory of members. The July Challenge will be a brown bag challenge. We will be putting a yard and a half of fabric, a paper (with your name, if you would like a table topper (square) or a table runner (rectangle) blocks you like and dislike) in a brown paper bag. At the February meeting you will pick a paper bag, not yours, and bring a finished table topper or table runner top back to the July meeting and return it to the person it belongs to. You will have their likes and dislikes to help you. Bring a finished top, the owner will finish it from there.

WORKSHOP January 20, 2024

9-3, Park United Methodist Church The project we will be working on is called Outside the Box, from American Patchwork and Quilting Magazine, August 2010. The size depends upon what size of square you want to cut. If you use 3½" squares, you will end up with a 72" square quilt. If you use 21/2" squares, you will have a 48" square quilt.



You will need:

- 13 1/3 yard each assorted medium to dark color pieces. Cut 28 from each piece making a total of 360 pieces.
- 8 1/3 yard cuts of light pieces. Cut 27 from each piece making a total of 216 pieces. Fat-quarters may be used, as well as lots of scraps.

Each block is sewn the same way and by turning the blocks you can come up with 10 or more combinations for your quilt top. There are 16 squares in a block and 36 blocks in the quilt. Sign up at the meeting or let me know if you are interested in coming, so I will have enough instructions for the workshop. If you don't want to do the project, you are always welcome to come and work on your own project. -- Sue Ann Winking


